I am a Chestfield resident currently and we are very aware of the strain on resources currently, and below are just some of the concerns;

1. Water pipes have already been leaking all over Chestfield as the water system is not able to cope.

2. The roads are crumbling due to the excess of traffic now using them, which would only be exacerbated by more residents using the roads.

3. There is already such a high water table that ground water is already an issue in this high clay area, again this would be made worse by the removal of agricultural land to be concrete over.
