Dear Policy and Strategy Team,

Thank you for the email below and initial review of the above site. We have concerns with your assessment that the site has not been considered for development due to capacity concerns on the local highway network, please see extract below from the SLAA Appendix C -Site Assessments (July 2022):

Is the site technically suitable for development? (If the nature and scale of the constraint is such that is can be mitigated considering cost) (yes or further information needed but this is only if technical suitability hasn't been demonstrated - do not consider yield/ design).

No: there are concerns regarding capacity on the local highway network.

Please see our Formal Technical Responses below:

We submitted the site, in response to the call for sites, for additional business and employment use, both of which are needed throughout the district. The site forms part of a previously developed area that already provides business and employment use. The adjoining site, currently in use and fully occupied, provided a new right turn lane as part of the 2017 planning application that was supported by KCC Highways and then constructed in 2019. Please see extract of the Delegated Report prepared 1st May 2018 regarding the proposed right hand turn and KCC Highways acceptance.

- 28. Kent County Council Highway Authority have raised no objections to the revised layout which proposed a right tune lane from Thanet Way to facilitate access to the site. The revised layout will ensure vehicles enter the site and limit the number of u-turns at Chestfield roundabout. The right turn lane has been separated from the existing right turn lane into the existing petrol station by a traffic island in line with comments from KCC Highways Team. The new traffic island will help to alleviate pedestrian safety concerns and provides a safe crossing point across Thanet Way.
- 29. The Parish Council were reconsulted on the amended layout as they had originally stated that they did not want a right hand turn. They have raised no objections as KCC Highways have requested this and are satisfied with the proposals.
- 30. The proposal would not have an impact upon highway safety and the level of parking proposed accords with KCC Vehicle Parking Standards. The proposal would therefore comply with policy T9 of the Local Plan.

In addition to this, both KCC Highways and CCC Transportation Engineer had no objections regarding the capacity on the local highway network to a 2019 planning application for additional units on this site. Please see attached technical representations received at the time. Paragraph 109 of the NPPF states that development should only be prevented or refused on highways grounds if there would be an unacceptable impact on highway safety, or the residual cumulative impacts on the road network would be severe.

The proposed scheme would utilise an existing access that was approved under application CA/17/01056/FUL, where it was established that this would represent a safe access on to the highway.

Therefore, we believe the initial assessment based on capacity on the local highway network needs to be reviewed and reassessed accordingly.
